President's Message

Hard to believe the holiday season is already upon us! Amongst many other things, that means time for our holiday luncheon and a new slate of officers. We could really use your help in filling some of our Board of Director vacancies for both the Chapter and the Outreach Foundation. Too many people are wearing multiple hats and we don't want to burn them out. For the Chapter, we really need a Legislative Liaison (Dave Garcia has been promoted from regional to State roles and must step down). I had that position in the past and it is very interesting.

We also need someone for Programs/Door Prizes, as well as for Publicity. For the Outreach Foundation, we need a Vice President, Marketing Director, Secretary, and a Fundraising Director. Please find it in your heart to join us in keeping our 68 year old Chapter going. These positions do not require a big time commitment.

There is a lot going on in the legislative arena. I strongly urge each of you to sign up for the MOAA Take Action Center at https://moaa.quorum.us/. It is easy to sign up and once you do so, it will automatically populate your communications to our legislators. There is even a tutorial to help you sign up for the first time: https://www.moaa.org/content/publications-and-media/news-articles/2022-news-articles/advocacy/meet-moaas-new-legislative-action-center. When you sign up and send your letters, be sure to list the El Paso Chapter so MOAA National knows how engaged we are in protecting our earned benefits.

Here is just one example of the issues out there could affect you.

On July 26, the Senate Armed Services Committee (SASC) Personnel Subcommittee held a hearing on potential budgetary efficiencies. The Congressional Budget Office (CBO) submitted a written statement that includes concepts to raise TRICARE fees for military retirees, including seniors on TRICARE For Life (TFL). Recent TRICARE cuts such as the disproportionate copay increases for retirees and a smaller TRICARE pharmacy network have already negatively impacted active and retired service members and their families. Here is a quick look at the two proposals:

TFL Enrollment Fee

TFL beneficiaries pay Medicare Part B premiums, but TFL enrollment is automatic, and there is no enrollment fee or monthly premium for TFL coverage. A CBO proposal would require Medicare-eligible beneficiaries who choose to enroll in TFL to pay *an annual enrollment fee of \$575 for individual coverage or* \$1,150 for family coverage. The enrollment fees would be indexed to grow at the same rate as average Medicare costs in later years.

TFL Cost-Sharing

The other CBO measure would introduce minimum out-of-pocket requirements in TFL, including an \$850 deductible – TFL would not cover any of the first \$850 of a beneficiary's Medicare cost-sharing. After the deductible was satisfied, TFL would cover only 50% of the next \$7,650 in Medicare cost-sharing. This means TFL beneficiaries could face *up to \$4,675 in cost-sharing per year*. Similar to the enrollment fee proposal, cost-sharing requirements would increase annually at the rate of Medicare cost increases. The cost-sharing option would also require TFL beneficiaries seeking care from military treatment facilities (MTFs) to make payments roughly comparable to the charges they would face at civilian facilities.

MOAA will fight any attempts to reduce the TFL benefit for retirees, but they cannot do it alone. We must each join them by telling our 2 Senators and 1 Congresswoman to reject the CBO's TFL proposals at https://moaa.quorum.us/campaign/44139/. Lawmakers are influenced by communications from their constituents. You must engage before it is too late and you wonder how this happened. Moreover, at a time when all services are missing their recruiting goals, it will be hard for us to recommend military service to young people as we see our earned benefits erode.

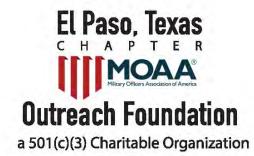

Invest in charitable organizations

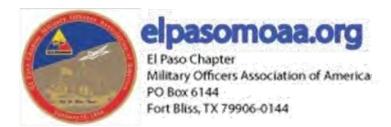

Washington State MOAA Leader Is Passionate About Helping Surviving Spouses

When Cheryl Toland's husband of nearly 47 years died of Agent Orange-related heart problems in 2018, she did not even know what a "surviving spouse liaison" was.

But the MOAA chapter where CW4 Robert Toland, USA (Ret), had been a member stepped up to help — and changed her life.

"I became a surviving spouse at only 68," she said. "I was afraid my life didn't have much of a direction, but my MOAA Mount Rainier Chapter helped bring me out of that fear."

Now age 74, she is not only the surviving spouse liaison for the Mount Rainier (Wash.) Chapter but also vice president for surviving spouse affairs for MOAA's Washington State Council of Chapters. Honoring her relentless work to help others, Toland has been named council-level recipient of MOAA's 2023 Surviving Spouse Liaison Excellence Award.

Among those who praise her dedication is Col. David R. Casteel, USAF (Ret), president of the Washington State Council of Chapters, who said Toland is determined to keep MOAA members informed.

"I wish I could clone her passion and zeal to educate and advocate and infuse it into each chapter," Casteel said. "She has made a difference in our council and our chapters, but she knows more needs — and can be — done and is always looking for ways to do so."

Toland, a Life Member of MOAA, said her commitment springs from joyful days as the "proud wife of a warrant officer." She encourages everyone to pay attention to survivor benefits, no matter age or status. "You will need to know it someday," she said.

In any given week, she might speak to a neighboring MOAA chapter about what members need to know before becoming a surviving spouse, contact a widow or widower to offer guidance, update a presentation for a Mount Rainier Chapter meeting, or write her monthly column for the newsletter. She diligently researches legislation that affects active duty and retired members of the military and their spouses and frequently says, "You need to contact your congressman on this."

She also is a member of MOAA's Surviving Spouse Virtual Chapter, helps surviving spouses in the U.S. Army Warrant Officers Association chapter at Joint Base Lewis-McChord, is a facilitator of a GriefShare program at her church, and is involved with the Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors, the Elizabeth Dole Foundation, the VA Caregivers Assistance Program, and Gold Star Wives. A retired hairdresser of 54 years, she squeezes in time to give free haircuts and perms at an assisted-living facility and goes for daily walks with her son who lives nearby.

Her experiences as a surviving spouse have led to hard-earned advice for surviving spouses. "I think it was one of the ways after Bob died that I survived," she said. "Part of healing is helping others through the things you have experienced. We are told in scriptures to serve others as we have been served. ... Don't become stagnant. Don't get stuck in your grief. The more you help others, the more it helps you heal."

Make a Difference for Those in Need ... and Save on Medicare Premiums?

The recent release of <u>2024 Medicare Part B premium rates</u>, including adjusted rates for those in higher income brackets, may give some MOAA members the chance to consider charitable donations as a way to reduce their own health care costs.

It's one of several techniques for smart charitable giving – the subject of a recent MOAA webinar featuring Lila Quintiliani, ChFC, AFC, MOAA's program director for financial and benefits education and counseling, as well as Daniel Kopp, MA, MS, CFP, the founder of <u>Wise Stewardship Financial Planning</u> and longtime MOAA member.

Kopp discussed Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) – payments directly from your IRA custodian to a qualified charity. Many retirees in their 70s and beyond are familiar with these payouts, as they can be used to help satisfy Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs).

QCDs also are excluded from your taxable income, which results in a lower Modified Adjusted Gross Income (MAGI) – the figure used to calculate the Income Related Monthly Adjustment Amount (IRMAA) added to your Medicare premium.

Nearing acronym overload? Here's the bottom line: Donating via a QCD will lower your income levels and could put you in line for a lower Medicare Part B rate in future years. IRMAA calculations generally rely on tax filings from two years ago, though appeals are possible.

"QCDs can be extremely powerful if we are doing careful income tax planning on a year-by-year basis," Kopp said during the webinar. "We can save, in many cases, hundreds, even thousands of dollars a year in tax planning. ... QCDs can not just benefit you in the year that you get them, but they can also save you down the road."

Kopp suggested speaking with your financial adviser about the use of QCDs, especially as not all charitable donations will result in a MAGI deduction. Contributions to your retirement account may reduce the amount of QCD allowed. While MOAA cannot offer financial guidance specific to your situation, resources at MOAA.org/ Finance will help prepare you for such a discussion.

The webinar also addressed Charitable Gift Annuities (CGAs), Donor-Advised Funds (DAFs), and other giving strategies. It also covered details on MOAA's charitable efforts, including ways to donate using these tools and others to support The MOAA Foundation's Crisis Relief Program.

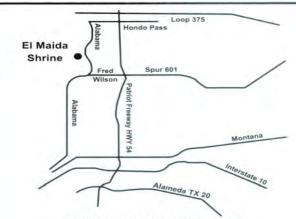

Kansas Chapter Member Honored for Guiding Surviving Spouses Step-by-Step

Lt. Col. Roy Yenchesky, USA (Ret), has been married for 47 years, yet offered to serve as surviving spouse liaison — a position often held by a widow or widower — when the <u>Wichita (Kan.) Chapter of MOAA</u> needed him nearly five years ago.

"I had been a financial advisor for eight years and helped several of my clients through the death of a loved one," he said. When the longtime chapter surviving spouse liaison moved and after many months of not being able to find a replacement, Yenchesky spoke up and said, "I can do that."

A Life Member of MOAA, he is driven to help by "the knowledge that our surviving spouses may need guidance through the maze of benefits they are entitled to. ... It is a very complex journey, and even after five years, I am still learning."

Using checklists, he approaches survivors in a low-key manner and takes them through what needs to be done. "Everyone deals with grief differently," he said.

For his dedication in assisting surviving spouses in small and large ways, Yenchesky has been named chapter-level recipient of MOAA's 2023 Surviving Spouse Liaison Excellence Award.

Appreciation for him comes from both MOAA leaders and spouses, such as Sue Tanner, The Retired Officers Wives Club president and MOAA member, who benefited from his help after her husband died.

"It seems that Roy is always searching for more ways to simplify things for spouses as they are trying to navigate the military system alone once they have lost their spouse," Tanner said. "He has made things so much easier for not only me but also many of the other spouses."

Lt. Col. Michael R. George, USAF (Ret), president of the Wichita Chapter, agreed.

"Roy contacts surviving spouses and families of deceased members and assists them in contacting the applicable support agencies so that benefits are not interrupted or missed. ... When engaging members in conversation, his emphasis is that *now* is the time to take care of personal affairs. He beseeches members not to wait until there is a death to address these critical issues."

Yenchesky served in the Army for 26 years and commanded units in Korea, Germany, and the U.S. He did a combat tour in Vietnam and trained future officers at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y., and in ROTC assignments. He started Junior ROTC in Wichita, now available in eight area high schools and 11 middle schools. He is treasurer and membership chair for the Badger State All Airborne Chapter of the 82nd Airborne Association and a member of the 173rd Airborne Association, AMVETS, and the American Legion.

Yenchesky centers his weekday schedule around babysitting his granddaughters, ages 6 and 3. "We play outside, build stuff with blocks, paint, color, do crafts, play family ... and do a lot of reading."

His advice for his granddaughters? Exactly what he practices as a MOAA volunteer: "Be kind."

Colonel Lee C. Freeman

Colonel Lee C. Freeman is the Director, El Paso Military Health System, and Commander, William Beaumont Army Medical Center. He was born and raised in Indiana where attended the Virginia Military Institute and upon graduation was commissioned through the Reserve Officer Training Corps as a Medical Service Corps officer. He also holds master's degrees from the National War College in National Security Strategy and the Defense Intelligence Agency's National Intelligence University in Strategic Intelligence.

COL Freeman's initial assignment was as the Medical Platoon Leader for 2-6 Infantry Battalion, 1st Armored Division, Baumholder, Germany with a deployment in support of SFOR to Bosnia-Herzegovina. He was next assigned as the Executive Officer for US Army Health Clinic Baumholder. In July 2000 he was assigned to the Army Medical Department Center and School as an Officer Basic Course Instructor. In July

2002 he was assigned as the Combat Health Support Officer for 3rd Brigade, 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault), Fort Campbell, Kentucky and deployed in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom.

At the midpoint of the yearlong OIF tour he took command of the 801st Main Support Medical Company, 101st DISCOM. During the Division's transformation to the modular design concept, he was selected for a second command, the Sustainment Support Medical Company in the 101st SB and deployed in support of OIF 05-07.
